Garland Historic Home Tour

Six of the dwellings are in the Travis College Hill National Register Historic District, with Garland's 11th Street at its heart (between Avenues B and D), while two are in neighboring historic Embree, one of the two communities that were combined to form Garland in 1891.

The home tour will be from 5 to 9 p.m. on December 5. It will feature horse-drawn carriage rides provided by Majestic Carriages, live music by carolers, hot cocoa, and a Santa Claus that will be available for photo ops plus will narrate about how Christmases were observed in 1913, the year that the Travis College Hill Addition was founded in Garland.

Two of the Travis College Hill dwellings that are open to the public date to 1913, one to 1915, and one to 1918. All these are of the bungalow architectural movement with Craftsman influences. One of those on the tour will be Garland's Historic Pace House, a Queen Anne-style Victorian, completed sometime between 1895 and 1901. Originally the main dwelling on a cotton farm situated at the current intersection of North First and State in Garland, the home was first moved to behind Garland's City Hall, where it was an event center for the City of Garland from 1985-2013. In 2014, when transit-oriented housing was built on its site, the dwelling was relocated to 11th Street.

The two homes in Embree are at 616 South 9th Street (built in 1939) and 909 West Avenue E. The latter, a Victorian farmhouse-style home, was built in 2012 on the site of Garland's First Christian Church parsonage.

The exteriors of all 12 of the 11th-Street homes that comprise the Travis College Hill historic district will be illuminated for the tour. This is the fifth-annual home tour in Travis College Hill.

Home-tour tickets are available by clicking <u>TICKETS</u> and also will be available on the evening of the tour. The event, sponsored by the Friends of Garland's Historic 11th Street nonprofit, is being held concurrently with Garland's Christmas on the Square in downtown Garland.
