Cemetery Report

Our executive board members and Betsy Farris were busy in January, visiting, taking pictures, and commenting on TWENTY-THREE cemeteries! Bill Vilbig visited Garvin Memorial/Smith Hall Cemetery on January 15, 2023, and wrote: "Securing a parking place was very hard because the surrounding properties are gated. It was well mowed but a lot of trash scattered further back into the cemetery around the boundaries of the cemetery. I was reminded why it is not very safe to visit/inspect some of the cemeteries alone. The last photo [that he attached] reveals the edge of a person's tent on the left who was likely the source of the trash and prompted my quick exit." He shared interesting information that he found on dallascityhall.com, including City Ordinance #26727, maps of the cemetery and surrounding properties. Pictures from Bill's visit to the Cox Cemetery. The other TWENTY-TWO visits will be posted, so keep looking at the Cemeteries on our website dallaspioneer.org.

The Lost Cemetery of Pleasant Mound

Realizing others have likely written more scholarly on the same subject, here is my offering that might generally stimulate discussion and provide for my continuing education. At the 2022 Pioneer Picnic, our members M.C. Toyer and Tim Dalbey talked about some of their shared history. Notable was their visit to Scyene Cemetery that is south of Scyene Rd. and west of Prairie Creek (the creek).

My recollections of the area began when my love of history was awakening by my noticing a street sign, "Etta," and Lillie Thompson telling me that was the name of the one of the Moores. We admired the stately old Moore House that remained on acreage fronting on Scyene Rd. The Moore House was discussed by generations born in the early 1900s because of its appearance and the memories of the generous hospitality offered there. The words, "I hope that someone preserves the Moore's house," were spoken until regrets were offered after it was demolished.

The land around the cemetery is in the former community of Pleasant Mound which was related to the platted town of Thorpeville or Scyene, by the short distance of separation and by the relationships of the inhabitants. Deed records show that over time part of the land had been owned by pioneers (George W. Cox of Montague County who sold to his brother Hartwell B. Cox of Scyene). Eventually ownership of many acres passed to Tom and Etta (Elam) Moore who built the Moore House. In the 1950s, single family residences were developed and the cemetery was left with the legal description of a single lot.

A Moore descendant said that Tom and Etta were affectionately called "Pa and Ma Moore" and they are buried in Pleasant Mound Cemetery. In 1859 Tom's grandmother Hulda Hunnicutt Moore and Uncle Jim brought him to Dallas to claim the estate of his deceased parents. Hulda is buried in the W.W. Glover Cemetery on Military Parkway.

Members of the Moore family, who attended the Pioneer Picnic did not recall mention of the Scyene Cemetery. At some point, M.C. became aware of the cemetery and he and Tim visited. I hope they will share the story of the research and discovery.

Willie Newbury Lewis - Socialite - Ranch Owner - Author




Willie Newbury Lewis was an author who became known for her work pertaining to the early days of Anglo settlement in North Texas and the Panhandle. Her biographical information has been recounted in numerous newspaper articles, which are the main sources for this brief sketch.

Willie was born October 28, 1891 to Henry Lee Newbury (1866 – 1939) and Anna Hearn Newbury (1867 – 1951), and was the second of three children, between her two brothers. Her parents

and grandparents had been in the mercantile business with her father owning a shoe store in Dallas when she was young. Henry Lee later went into banking and worked as a controller at First National Bank.

As a young girl, Willie attended Lora Cowart's Private School for Girls, a small school in Oak Cliff. She was also an Idlewild debutante. Most accounts mention how she met her future husband, more...
