# **Cemetery Report**

A representative of D. R. Horton, met with us to visit the **Myers Cemetery** on Bobtown Rd. (north of Barnes Bridge Rd. near city limit of Garland) where housing development construction is in progress. We appreciate the protection provided by the temporary fencing around the cemetery that was installed at the direction of the construction superintendent who told us that the City of Garland will be improving Bobtown Rd., adjacent to the cemetery, and for that reason they had no immediate plans to add a sidewalk between the cemetery and the road. We are delighted that the Home Owners Association Coordinator added the installation of new fencing around the cemetery and ongoing maintenance to the HOA contract.

Bill Vilbig visited and took pictures of more cemeteries! Mike Magers is periodically adding cemetery pictures to <u>dallaspioneer.org</u> and posting to our Dallas County Pioneer Association Facebook group.

Texas Trees Foundation has a project to beautify Freedman's Cemetery (southwest corner North Central Expressway and Lemmon Ave., Dallas, Texas).

A group at **Bullock Chapel CME Church** on E. Overton Rd. is interested in checking on the nearby Overton Community and <u>Overton Family Cemetery</u> (E. Overton Rd. and Leatherwood St., Dallas, Texas). There is a historical marker near Leatherwood St. A DCPA member formerly paid for the mowing and years ago said she did not

Due to the interest of a neighborhood association an almost forgotten cemetery in Dallas, Texas, is being investigated. I was asked if we knew of a cemetery on Persimmon Road. We found it on a list provided by Frances James: "**Tarver Cemetery** – 3034 Persimmon Rd., Dallas. South side Persimmon Road near Miller Park, Black cemetery, no stones." Reportedly long-time residents of the area remember the cemetery on the north side of Persimmon Rd.

Our spring Cemetery Events were fun and educational, including the spring cleanup of Wesley Cockrell Cemetery and W. W. Glover Cemetery. At the Wesley Cockrell, Mike Rowlands gave us instructions and hands-on experience working on tombstone and ledger repair. # **BBQ Anyone**

Dallas Morning News columnist Steve Blow wrote early in the twenty-first century that **Bryan's Smokehouse** was the oldest restaurant still operating in Dallas. With a wink to Vincents (1898) this might be true.

Elias and Sadie Bryan moved to Oak Cliff from Cincinnati, Ohio in the beginning of the twentieth century. On February 13, 1910 Elias opened his Smokehouse on Centre Street. His smoked meats established the family secret of cooking untrimmed fat meats with the lean side down. The beef stayed moist because the fat cooked through it and was caught in a pan before it could flare up in the fire.

Elias experimented with sauces to complement his meat. He tried thin sweet and sour sauces like the southern tradition of barbecue and thick, spicy sauces like the southwest tradition. In each case the meat drippings flavored the sauce rather than the reverse. He settled upon the thick spicy recipe, which is still served today. <a href="mailto:more...">more...</a>
