

Betsy Farris' Irving Cemetery Tour began at Kit Cemetery on E. Irving Blvd. with DCPA president and vice president, several lifetime members and a potential member soaking up the sights and information. As is customary we met for hamburgers and great conversation afterwards. At a later date, her Sowers Cemetery (Irving) 2023 appreciation day and fundraiser was successful with fun for all.

Cleanup of McKinney Family Cemetery (Dallas) was rewarding in that the work of the crew of four Beeman family descendants along with two other DCPA members was smoothly coordinated because of our working together so often! First the tombstones were marked with orange traffic

cones for protection. We moved out plenty of trash, cut saplings of many varieties (leaving the native nut tree at the directions of Marsah Leach and Gwyneva Winters) and Wally Daniels precisely mowed.

Mike and Shelly Rowlands of Historic Stone Preservation and Restoration met us at McAdams (Brookhaven) Cemetery with the result that a large multi-piece tombstone is standing tall and proud. The **CONSTELLATION OF LIVING MEMORIALS** (CLM), a program of Friends of Warren Ferris Cemetery has a new website. The stated mission is "to revive the sacred grounds of historic cemeteries by reactivating their true natural and cultural characteristics so that they can offer an authentic sense of place, heritage, and belonging to their surrounding communities." The vision is "a transformation of the land from invasive, overgrown pollinator deserts and cookie-cutter landscapes into self-sustaining and thriving native habitats, rich with renewed life."

Scary Cemeteries are their Passion

Old, spooky graveyards are all over North Texas. They lie off unpaved country roads outside of town, tucked beside commercial buildings in urban areas, even in the corners of some people's backyards.

Often they're old family plots with no relatives still alive to take care of them. Others are larger community cemeteries whose caretakers are long dead, leaving their crumbling headstones surrounded by overgrown brush.

So this Halloween, we applaud the dozens of hard-working volunteers who spend countless hours tending to the often-forgotten resting places, making them less scary and more sacred.

Among them is **Julie Fineman**, a master naturalist who recently transformed the 19th century Warren Ferris Cemetery near her East Dallas home into a wildlife refuge. She recruited neighbors and together they cleared out the dense, non-native plants that covered the graves and began restoring the ground to its original Blackland Prairie. They've also planted wildflower seeds. **more...**

What's in a Name

Collett Henry Munger (Collett Avenue) was the manager of the Munger Place development. Collett was the son of Robert S. and Mary Collett Munger and was born and died in Dallas. Collett died of a heart attack at the age of 48 after returning home from a theatrical performance. He is buried at Grove Hill Cemetery along with some of his uncles and their families.

Robert Sylvester Munger (Munger Place, Munger Avenue, etc.) lived in Dallas from about 1880 to 1890 but had a profound influence on East Dallas and the Deep Ellum area. He built a cotton gin equipment manufacturing company here before relocating to Alabama in order to build a similar facility to service markets in the southeastern states. After moving to Alabama, he bought land and developed Munger Place, managed by his son Collett Munger. He died and was buried in Birmingham, Alabama.

George Washington "Uncle Peahull" Ledbetter (Ledbetter Drive) was born at Cockrell Hill in 1859 and died in 1933. G. W. was a co-owner of a thresher and engine. He and his brother Arthur Leonard Ledbetter contracted to do virtually all of the threshing in southwestern Dallas County. Uncle Peahull was a Commissioner of Dallas County for 8 terms, 1916-1933, and Ledbetter Drive is named for Uncle Peahull Ledbetter.

Marvin Ezra Loving (Marvin Loving Drive) was a grandson of James Loving (1811-1869), and the son of William Bourland Loving (1850-1936). Marvin was born and died in Dallas County. His grandfather James Loving was an older brother of trail driver Oliver Loving.

Patrick Henry Lively (Lively Lane, Coppedge Lane, Woodfin Drive) came to Texas in 1853. Their second farm was 640 acres roughly bounded by Northwest Highway, Inwood Road, Midway Road and Park Lane. Typical of other developments when streets were platted they took often the names of the family members. Coppedge and Woodfin were family names of Lively descendants and spouses.
