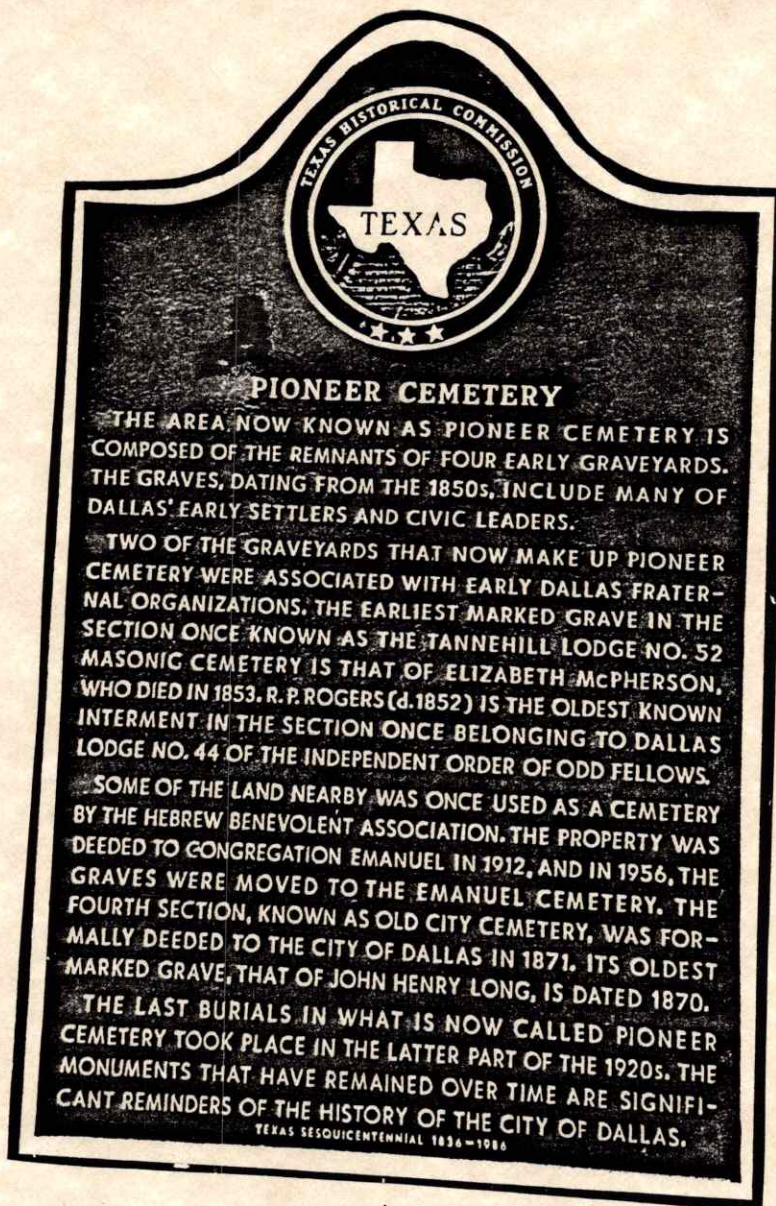

THE OLD CEMETERY

PUBLICATION OF HISTORY OF THE OLD CEMETERY

The publication of History of the Old Cemetery was sponsored by the James Butler Bonham Chapter of the DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS in 1938. Mrs. George F. Carlisle served as the Historic Spots Committee Chairman. She and twenty committee members researched the headstones and the history of people buried in the Old Cemetery (now known as the DALLAS PIONEER PARK CEMETERY).

Members of the Committee were Mrs. George F. Carlisle, Chairman, Miss Belle Ragsdale, Mrs. Fred Schenkenberg, Mrs. T.B. Griffith, Mrs. T.A. Scott, Mrs. M.N. Chrestman, Mrs. T.W. Davidson, Mrs. J.A. Wellborn, Mrs. C.V. Compton, Mrs. Homer B. Fisher, Mrs. George T. Sprau, Mrs. W.M. Winn, Jr., Mrs. W.L. Holland, Mrs. W.L. Funderburk, Mrs. John M. Spellman, Mrs. A.W. Adair, Mrs. Tom C. Gooch, Mrs. L.B. Hall, Mrs. Charles D. Adams, and Mrs. J.R. Bradfield.

Miss Florence Peak, though not a member, gave valuable assistance.

For ten years, 1938 - 1948, these ladies copied information on headstones and researched the lives of those buried in the cemetery. The book, HISTORY OF THE OLD CEMETERY, was copyrighted and published in 1948.

MRS. GEORGE FEARN (WILLIE FLOWERS) CARLISLE

Mrs. George Fearn (Willie Flowers) Carlisle became a member of the DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS May 26, 1936, Membership No. 002011. Her Texas Ancestor was Colonel Robert S. Hamilton, born in Nashville, Tennessee, 1794; came to Texas in 1830; bought 1,000 acres of land in Red River County for \$25.00 and lived there until he died in 1876. Hamilton County, Texas, was named for him. Four sons served with him in the Texas Army. Hamilton was one of the signers of the Texas Declaration of Independence; served with General Sam Houston and Albert Latimer as a committee of three to "treat" the Indians; and was appointed by President Sam Houston to serve as Judge of the Nacogdoches District.

Mrs. Carlisle was very proud of her Texas heritage and devoted many hours to the DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS. She died July 7, 1965, in Dallas, Texas.

FOREWORD (1948)

Mrs. Carlisle expressed her appreciation in the Foreword of The Old Cemetery, 1948:

"Since 1938, when the Historic Spots Committee of the James Butler Bonham Chapter of the DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS (Dallas) made the restoration of the Old Cemetery a major project, the Chairman of this Committee has spent considerable time in research, procuring all available data concerning the lives and deeds of those earliest settlers buried in this cemetery.

"The compiler owes a deep debt of gratitude for continuous interest, assistance, and encouragement to Members of the Old Cemetery Committee, the James Butler Bonham Chapter, DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS; THE DALLAS MORNING NEWS and late Manager, Mr. George B. Dealey; THE DAILY TIMES HERALD and Mr. Tom Gooch, Editor in Chief."

AN APPRECIATION (1948)

Dr. William E. Howard, Past State President of the SONS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS and State Historian of the SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, also expressed his appreciation for this endeavor:

"It has been said that 'the culture and spirituality of a people may be judged by the care and appreciation for the graves of their departed dead.' If such be the case, the patriotic efforts of the James Butler Bonham Chapter of the DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS in the city of Dallas, motivated by Mrs. George F. Carlisle, should be sincerely appreciated in their efforts to make a beauty spot of the pioneer Dallas Cemetery. It is the sincere wish of many of our citizens that their efforts be crowned with success.

"Long neglected, unkept, and unsightly, the last resting place of the founders of Dallas should be made a place of beauty. Situated in the center of Dallas, the cemetery will become a worthy tribute to our departed dead and an evidence of culture and spirituality of our citizenship."

(Dr. William E. Howard was a collector of Texana. He collected more historical material than any individual of his day and donated those rare treasures to many museums throughout Texas. The Alamo Library in San Antonio was a recipient of many of his choice gifts. Dr. Howard was made an Honorary Member of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas through the James Butler Bonham Chapter, Dallas.)

TANNEHILL LODGE NO. 52, A.F. & A.M.

The following information was contributed by Mr. E. W. Speer, Secretary, Tannehill Lodge, November 1947:

"The first dispensation was granted Tannehill Lodge January, 1848, by the Grand Lodge of Texas. For some unexplained reason this dispensation was not used during that year and was renewed by the Grand Lodge January, 1849, with John M. Crockett as Worshipful Master. The name 'Tannehill' was given in honor of Wilkins Tannehill, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee.

"Master Masons of Tannehill Lodge buried in the Old Cemetery, of whom there are records include:

"W. C. C. Akard, Wm. W. Barton, John J. Eakins, Neill B. McKinnon, W. B. Patillo, Jefferson Peak, Jr., Wm. Wallace Peak, James N. Smith, John W. Smith, and many others.

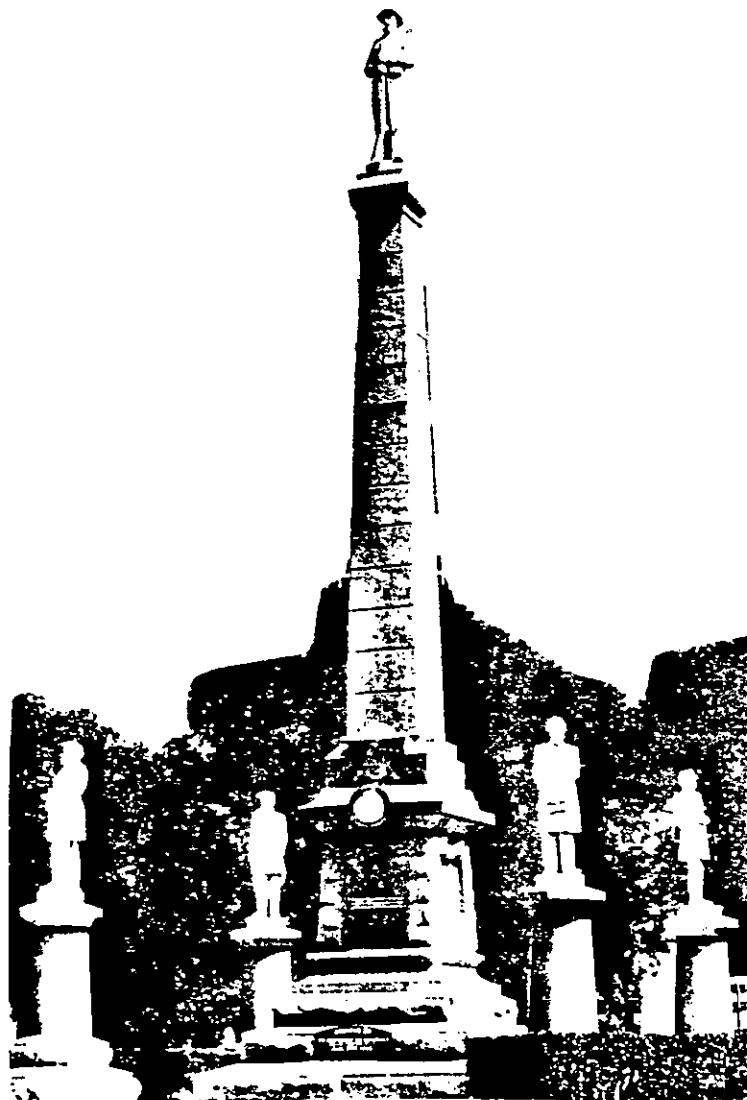
"Early officers of Tannehill Lodge include: John M. Crockett, First Worshipful Master, 1849-1850 and 1853-1855; J. W. Latimer, Junior Warden, 1854-1855, Senior Warden 1855-1856, Worshipful Master, 1856-1857; J. B. McDermett, one of the original five organizing members; John J. Good, Worshipful Master, 1874-1875, also served as presiding officer of Dallas Chapter No. 47 R.A.M., and Commander of Dallas Commandery No. 6, Knights Templar; Alex Harwood, Senior Warden, 1854-1855, and 1960-1861; W. Marion Moon, Worshipful Master, 1886-1887; James M. Patterson, Junior Warden, 1860-1861, Senior Warden, 1861-1864; James K. P. Record, Worshipful Master, 1872-1873; Rev. James A. Smith, Senior Warden, 1853-1854, Worshipful Master 1855-1856, and for whom the James A. Smith Lodge No. 395, Farmers Branch, Texas, was named; Rev. Wm C. Young, Worshipful Master, 1870-1871, also High Priest of Dallas Chapter No. 47, R.A.M., and Commander of Dallas Commandery No. 6, Knights Templar."

DALLAS LODGE NO. 44, I.O.O.F.

Contributed by J. M. House, Secretary of Odd Fellow Lodge, No. 44, and copied from the booklet, HISTORICAL FACTS-ODD FELLOWSHIP:

"On the 4th day of July, A.D., 1854, was instituted by W. G. Holland, Deputy, acting under a dispensation issued by Grand Master J.W. Moore in 1853. The Charter members were John J. Good, who was elected first Noble Grand, R. C. Donaldson, E. P. Nicholson, Charles R. Pryor and John P. Shipley. For a few years the meeting place was in a gloomy attic, accessible only by a ladder which reached to an opening in a gable of a rough frame building, the lower floor being used for a carpenter shop and after the Civil War court

was held in the buildingThis Lodge owns a cemetery acquired in 1855 of one and one-half acres near the business section of the city.....In 1924 our new home at 309 South Pearl Street, corner of Young Street, was erected on lots acquired in 1919 and occupied by the lodge....."

HISTORY OF OLD CEMETERY (1948)

History of the Old Cemetery in the 1948 edition read:

"The first burial in this old cemetery is not known. The earliest headstone inscription bears the date of 1853, but there is evidence that earlier burials had been made. From county records it was found that B. Warren Stone owned most of the land in 1851 on which the Masonic and Odd Fellow sections are located, Masonic Street near Akard.

"On the 21st day of March A.D. 1857, John W. Smith, James N. Smith, W. L. Murphy, W. P. Martin, and Alexander Cockrell deeded this tract of land 'near the town of Dallas' containing three acres, more or less, 'from the N. E. cornerto the N. W. corner of the B. Warren Stone cemetery lotto Tannehill Lodge No. 52 of Ancient Y. Masons and Dallas Lodge No. 44 of Independent Order of Odd Fellow.. ...to be used by said lodges as a cemetery.'

"Of these donors, John W. Smith, James N. Smith, and W. P. Martin are buried in the Masonic section. Alexander Cockrell was buried in the same section, but his body was later moved to Greenwood Cemetery.

"The 1882 City Government, on motion of Alderman John Henry Brown, passed and carried out a resolution to rename many streets for names of our pioneers. In this cemetery will be found the names of many of our downtown streets.

"The City purchased the City section from Mrs. Nancy Turbeville. Mayor Henry S. Ervay and Aldermen Dr. F. L. Willemet, Dr. E. W. Tucker, and Samuel Crosley negotiated the purchase between December 19, 1870, and March 5, 1871, at \$175.00 per acre for cemetery purposes.

"The last burial in any section of the cemetery was that of the Reverend W.M.C. Young, who died March 21, 1921."

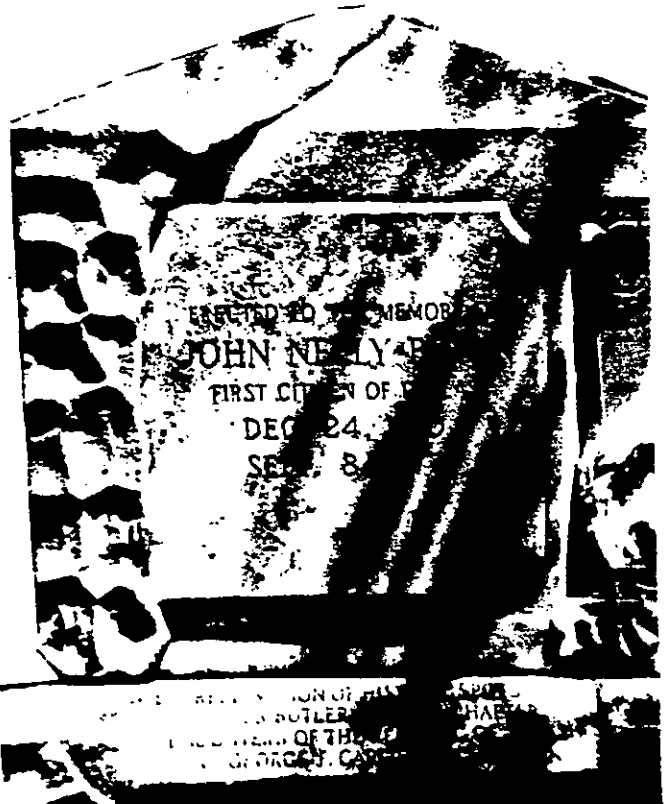

THE DALLAS PIONEER PARK CEMETERY

LOCATION OF DALLAS PIONEER PARK CEMETERY

The Old Cemetery is located in the southwest part of downtown Dallas, on a hill from which the Trinity River could be seen just to the west of the site. High rise business buildings and government buildings now obstruct the view of the river. Adjacent to the Cemetery on the south the construction of the Dallas Memorial Auditorium in the 1950's and of the Dallas Convention Center in the 1970's cut the cemetery down to less than half its original 15 acre size. In 1961 when R. L. Thornton Freeway was constructed through Old City Park, the 1886 Confederate Monument, erected by the Daughters of the Confederacy, Dallas Chapter No. 6, June 25th, 1896, and dedicated to the memory of the Confederacy, was moved from the Old City Park to the southeast corner of the Pioneer Cemetery. The monument, facing south, is an obelisk surrounded by statues of Robert E. Lee (SW corner), Jefferson Davis (SE corner), Stonewall Jackson (NW corner), and Albert S. Johnston (NE corner). A likeness of General W. L. Cabell "Old Tice" is carved on the obelisk.

In 1985 Cindy Smolovik, an archivist with the Dallas Public Library, wrote "Background and Sources for Further Information," including research by W. R. Conger, a teacher in Oak Cliff:

"Old cemeteries hold a fascination for historians, genealogists and the curious. In these resting places are valuable records, and in some cases the only record of past generations. Dallas County has many old burial grounds, from family plots to large cemeteries. The Masonic and Odd Fellow Cemeteries described in this collection are located in the downtown area between Griffin Street and Akard at Young. The remnants of these gravesites, combined with Old City Cemetery and a Confederate Memorial, are now a city park.

"As early as 1928 the cemetery was a source of controversy. The area was badly neglected, and weeds choked the paths. Vandals and age destroyed many stones. Calls to clean up the area went unheeded. In 1938 the James Butler Chapter of the DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS worked alone to get something accomplished, but the majority of the land was privately owned, and therefore untouchable. In 1944 a proposal to extend Field Street threatened to cut through the area. Newspapers reported unsightly conditions,

but this time the descendants and concerned citizens saved the area. Field Street Project engineers replanned the extension to curve around the cemetery. Even with this the Odd Fellow Cemetery was threatened by people parking in the area. The descendants were again outraged, and a court battle ensued. Once again, the cemetery was saved. Newspapers continued to report shameful conditions at the cemetery. One bright spot was the improvements made to the cemetery between 1953-1955 with money raised by the Florence C. Peak's Friends of the Pioneer Cemetery.

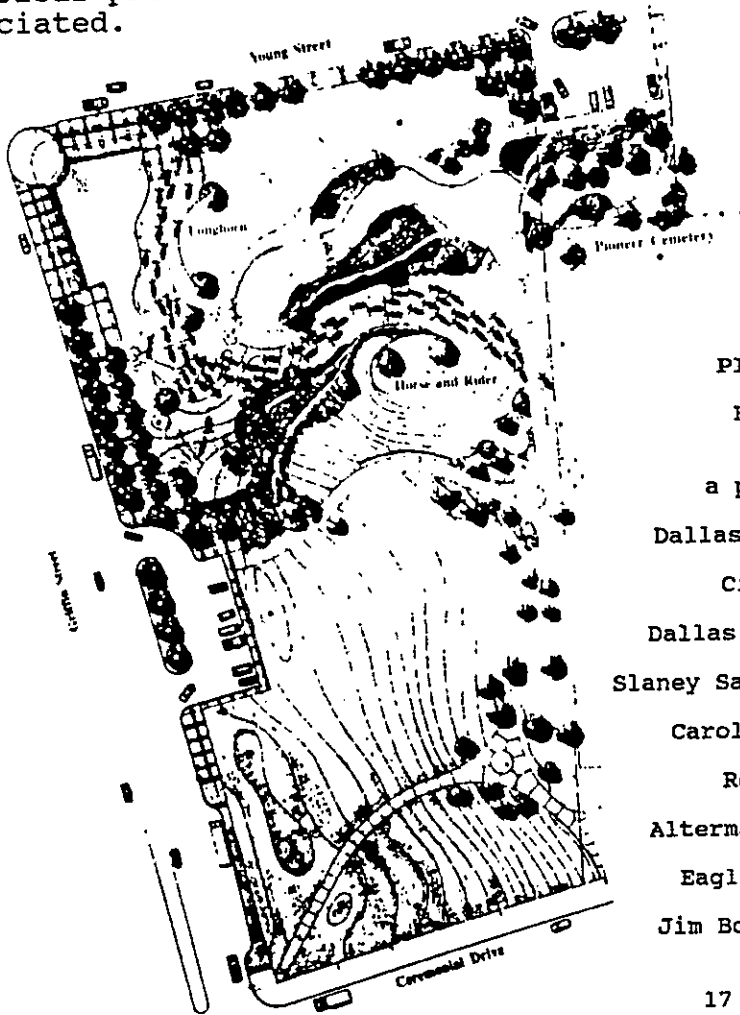
"In 1969 the City of Dallas purchased the cemetery and intended to use the land as the site for a new convention center. A battle again ensued over the cemetery. The solution was to relocate the City and Odd Fellow plots to the Masonic Cemetery. The Confederate Memorial was moved to its current location at this time. Today the area is kept by the City of Dallas as a park. It is finally clean and open to visitors, safe from weeds and vandals on the grounds of Memorial Auditorium and the Dallas Convention Center."

According to Bill Marvel's article "In History's Shadow" in the DALLAS MORNING NEWS, April 30, 1994: "In the shade of a stand of native post oaks, visitors to the Dallas Convention Center wander, scarcely aware that history lies buried beneath their feet. Tucked into a corner by the Dallas Convention Center, the cemetery is actually a remnant of four historic graveyards that occupied what was once a hillside just outside the little settlement of Dallas. 'The site originally encompassed Tannehill Lodge No. 52 Masonic Cemetery, Dallas Lodge No. 44 of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows Cemetery, a burial plot used by the Hebrew Benevolent Association, and the Old City Cemetery.'

"Many of the city's earliest settlers and civic leaders, including four of the city's first mayors, were buried here. Faded names on gravestones read like a roster of the city's first families: Akard, Stemmons, Crowder, O'Hara, Browder, Latimer, Seay, Crutchfield."

FRANCES JAMES

Mrs. Frances James, President of the Dallas County Pioneer Association, became interested in the preservation of Dallas County cemeteries in 1981 and has devoted personal time and energy working with Dallas County agencies for repair and maintenance of the Dallas Pioneer Park Cemetery. In 1984-1985 she assisted with the research and dedication of the Texas Historical Marker at the southeast corner of the Pioneer Cemetery, bringing historical focus to this site. Five historical gravemarkers were placed on graves under the encouragement of Mrs. James. She has continued to inspire descendants to erect markers that have been destroyed through time. Under her direction in 1993 the Dallas County Pioneer Association made an inventory of all stones that needed to be repaired and grounds that needed to be cleaned. She was involved with the Downtown Improvement District in the funding and the restoration of the cemetery. Her dedication to historical preservation in Dallas County is recognized and appreciated.

GRAVEMARKING CEREMONY

Eleanor Heady Russell, daughter of Stillwell Heady, married Nathan Guthrie in Kentucky and came to Texas in Austin's Colony in 1830. Mr. Guthrie died early in 1832 she was married to Captain William Jarvis Russell. She has been mentioned as the most notable woman of early Texas by many historians, for it was she who molded the bullets used by Captain Russell and his company of men who released William B. Travis and other colonists held in prison at Anahuac by Mexican soldiers. Her molded bullets also were used at the Battles of Velasco and San Jacinto. It was she and Mrs. Josiah Bell who tended the wounded General Sam Houston after the San Jacinto Battle.

Under the direction of Mrs. Berkley Smith, President of the James Butler Bonham Chapter, Dallas, DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS; Mrs. David S. Bays, President of the Hiram Bennett Chapter, Mesquite, DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS, and Mrs. Frances James, President of the Dallas County Pioneer Association, a gravemarking ceremony was held in 1994 in honor and memory of Mrs. William Jarvis (Eleanor Heady) Russell. A DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS Citizen of the Republic of Texas Seal was affixed to her gravestone.

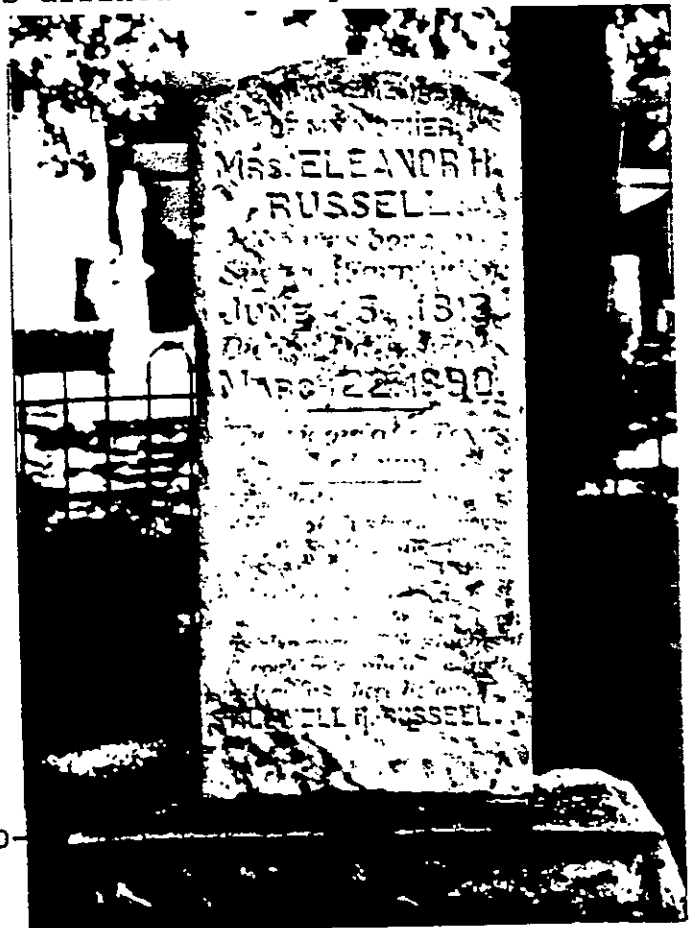

WILLIAM JARVIS RUSSELL

William Jarvis Russell was born in Onslow County, North Carolina, on January 3, 1802. A sea captain by profession, he came to Texas in 1826, settling in Brazoria. In March 1832 he married Mrs. Eleanor Heady Guthrie; they became parents of twelve children. Russell commanded a company of Texans from Brazoria at the Anahuac disturbances in May 1832 and on June 26 took command of the schooner Brazoria in the battle of Velasco. In October 1835 he joined the Texas Army at Gonzales as a member of James Walker Fannin's Brazoria Guards under command of Edward Burleson. Russell aided in the capture of Goliad on October 9, 1835, but missed the battle of San Jacinto because he had been sent from San Antonio to Brazoria to obtain more arms and ammunition. He remained with the guards until July 7, 1836, when he joined Byrd Lockhart's company of scouts as first lieutenant. Russell was discharged, with rank of Captain, on August 16 but had later military service as a courier from September 5 to September 24, 1836. In 1883 he was elected from Brazoria County to the Senate of the adjourned session of the Second Congress. About 1846 he moved to LaGrange and from 1849 to 1850 represented Fayette County in the House of the Third Legislature. He was also chief justice of Fayette County. Russell was president of the board of trustees of Rutgersville College and a member of the Texas Veteran Association. He died in Bexar County on November 5, 1881.

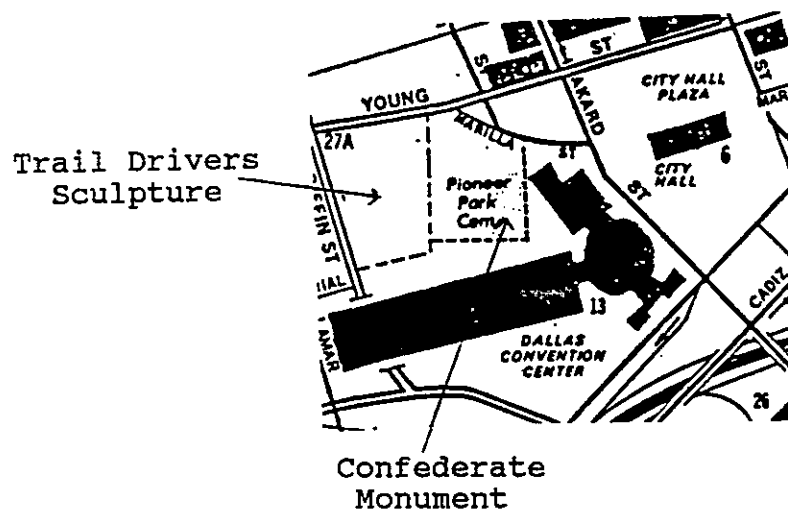
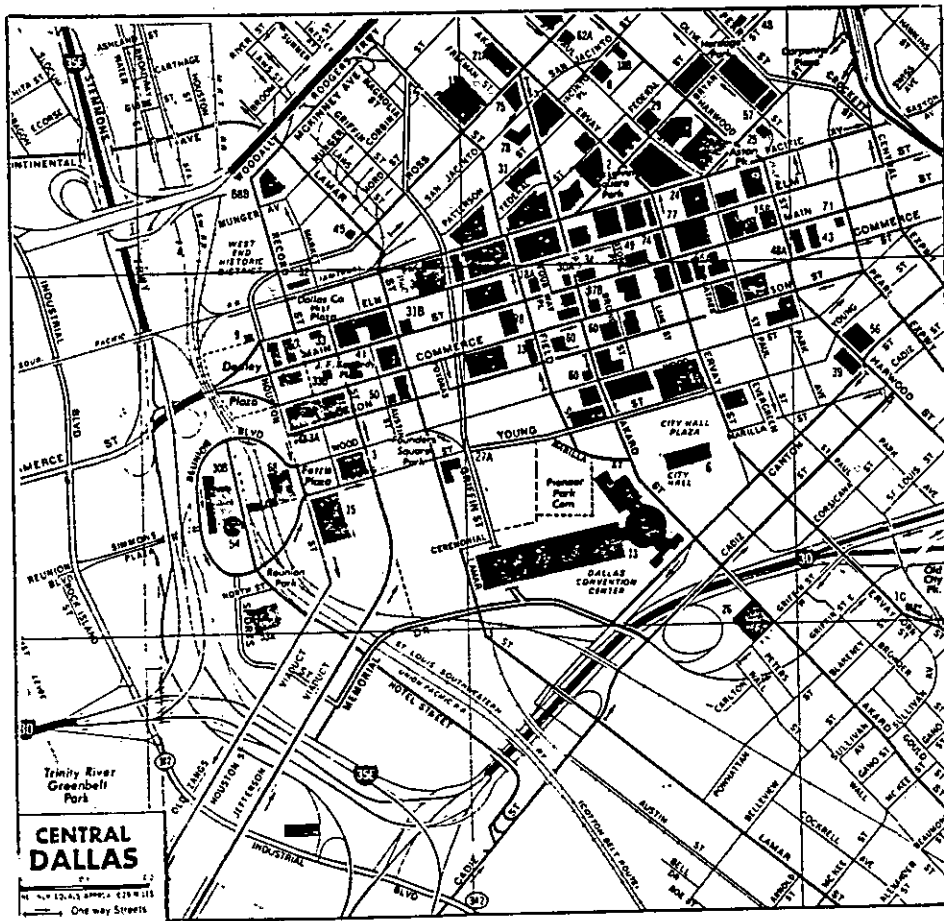
TRAIL DRIVERS SCULPTURE

A new public plaza is under development in Dallas and can be observed as the visitor approaches the Convention Center from downtown. This plaza will serve as a gateway to the expanded Center, an open space for strolling, and an outdoor reception area. It shares a block of land with the historic Pioneer Cemetery.

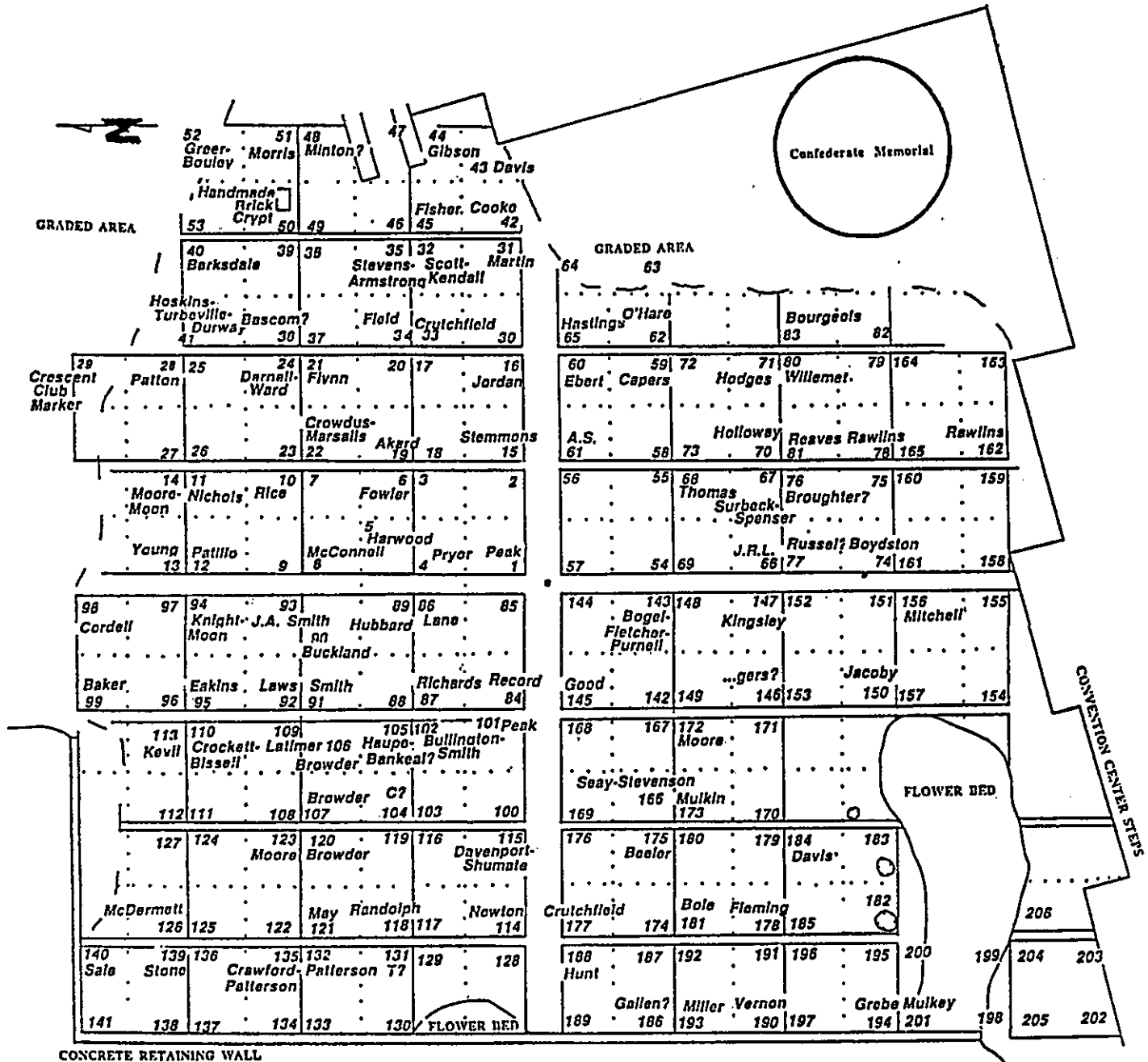
The feature that will be most remembered from this gateway plaza, to be called Pioneer Plaza after the Cemetery, will be a series of bronze statues by sculptor Robert Summers, consisting of seventy 7-foot-tall, 8-foot-long, 1200 pound bronze longhorn steers - as if frozen in time - moving north, watched by three attentive cowpokes. This cattle drive statuary collection of Texas history will be one and one-quarter life size and will be the largest bronze monument in the world. The Plaza will be completed in the spring of 1994, and the statues will be added over time as they are produced. The landscaping will include native flora typical of the area, a running stream with waterfall, and a stepping-stone crossing. The entire monument will have special lighting to turn the park into an evening attraction of special appeal.

This new plaza, to be the largest green-space in downtown Dallas, is a joint effort of the City of Dallas and the Dallas Parks Foundation, a private citizens group.

Headstone inscriptions are given when legible. Where there are no headstones, (many headstones have been completely destroyed) dates and other information were obtained from family BIBLES, county and city records, War Department, General Land Office of Texas, and files of the DALLAS HERALD. These records are noted in parentheses. Information on description or condition of gravesite is noted in brackets.

CITY SECTION

- BARTON, William W., Mar. 7, 1814-July 26, 1873.
(William W. White was born in Barron County, Kentucky. He came to Dallas in 1850.)
- CAIN, Maggie J., wife of A. Cain, May 5, 1850-Dec. 30, 1878. Erected by G. S., D. G., R., R. M., A. P., E. G. [Enclosed by an iron fence.] (Mrs. Cain, a widow, operated a boarding house for young men on Austin Street. The initials are those of her boarders.)
- COX, Martha Palmer, wife of G. H. Cox, June 29, 1810-Nov. 9, 1875.
- GRAY, Ann G., daughter of A. G. and R. H. Gray, 1875-1878.
- GRAY, Albert P., son of A. G. and R. H. Gray, 1877-1879.
[Broken stones near Gray lot with only legible dates, Oct. 27, 1857-July 27, 1875.]

Hoskins Lot

- HOSKINS, Bettie Fondren, wife of H. C. Hoskins, d. 1883.
- HOSKINS, Sallie Jane, wife of H. C. Hoskins, d. 1892.
- JAMES, Margaret C., mother of Bettie Fondren Hoskins, 1810-1885.
- Four small children of H. C. Hoskins.
[Enclosed by iron fence. No stones on this lot.]

Long Lot

- LONG, John Henry, Aug. 21, 1792-1870.
[Stone destroyed.] (John Henry Long was born in Tennessee. He served in the War of 1812 with an East Tennessee Regiment, in the Mexican War with Louisiana Volunteers,

and, though much over age, in the Confederate Army. He was captured and imprisoned by the Union forces.)

(Mrs. Mayes, wife of Dr. Mathew Mayes, had one of the first homes in Browder's Addition "The Cedars," and the street on which she lived was named Cadiz in honor of her birthplace.)
THOMAS, David, Mar. 7, 1813-Mar. 6, 1874.
(David Thomas was born in Tennessee. He enlisted in Co. A, Colonel Hawpe's 31st Cavalry Regiment in 1861. The census listed him as a land agent of Dallas.)
(WALDRON), Little Charlie.
[Stone broken] (Little Charlie was the son of Colonel E. J. and Agnes Mayes Waldron.)
ADAMS, Pearl, daughter of S. J. and Annie Adams, 1893-1894.

Jefferson came to Dallas in 1855 and bought the land that was later known as East Dallas or Peak's Addition. In 1861 he was enrolling officer for the enlistment of men for the Confederate Army. He donated the land for many East Dallas streets, and some of these streets still bear names of members of his family. He was Senior Warden, Worshipful Master, and was for many years Chaplain of Tannehill Masonic Lodge.)

He was elected County Clerk in 1848, his only public office. His business was burned out in the great fire of 1860, and he did not re-enter the mercantile business until after the war when he entered into partnership with his son-in-law, William Wallace Peak. He was one of the donors of the Masonic and Odd Fellow sections of the cemetery in which he is buried.)
